Matt will start things off with Charlie Craven's Dirty Hippy. This large-profile streamer is designed with big water and trophy trout in mind, but can be easily tailored to imitate a variety of fresh- and saltwater baitfish.



The following week, we welcome Kevin Green to the instructor's table to show us his Purple Sand Crab—a bulletproof pattern for the Southern California surf.



Next up, Joe Libeu is back with an encore presentation of his Cul de Canard (CDC) class. CDC is one of the most versatile and fishy natural materials out there—come see what Joe has cooked up for us this time!





Finally, we have a special shout-out to Mike Sweeney, the winner of our buffalo fur fly tying contest with a super-realistic mouse pattern. Awesome job, Mike!

Crowley Club Trip Coming up Soon!


Trip is October 1-5. Contact Steve Timm to arrange for lodging and receive fly tying recipes

The Long Beach Casting Club's Two Successful Trips to the Green River Make for Another Year of Fantastic Fishing Memories

The red ochre canyons and shining emerald waters of the Green River once again delivered a spectacular experience for LBCC anglers. Large buttery brown trout and stout bright rainbows were happy to connect with us throughout the trip. Many folks enjoyed double-digit days, with 16" or larger fish taken on both dries and nymphs.

The first week saw slightly more nymph fishing opportunities than dries, but both were fun and productive. Even the lake at Red Canyon Lodge offered good fishing, with chunky rainbows waiting for anyone

who found that eight hours of floating or walking the river wasn't enough angling for one day.

The camaraderie was terrific, with group meals full of laughs. We had several first-timers to the Green during the first week who did very well. Joe Saldaña got his first brown trout on a dry fly and his largest brown trout ever. Mike Rey racked up the fish count and even came in for a near-tie for the largest fish, only to be slightly outdone by Sandy O'Donnell. Isn't it always that way, fellas? I can hear that old blues song from Taj Mahal right now.


Two groups of happy successful members made the annual pilgrimage to the Green River. These trips are popular each year, with 34 members participating.

Fishing and catching was great, with the daily afternoon mayfly hatch being a significant factor bringing success. From around 11:00 am until 6:00 pm the mayflies were hatching in unusually large numbers in Week Two. During these very heavy hatches, the water surface contained more than 100 flies per square foot. Also, "foam piles" of mayflies were commonly found along the shoreline, especially in slower water.

Weather triggered the blue-winged olive mayfly hatch in huge numbers. Weather was milder the first week, while the second saw Utah spring-like weather with snow, sleet, hail, gusty wind and rain. Hot days calmed the mayfly hatch, with significantly lower numbers of rising fish.

When the surface is covered with mayflies, dry fly fishing becomes more luck than accuracy in catching rising fish. Occasionally, a trout would rise to a mayfly. However, the primary feeding pattern was rising and eating rhythmically, with mouth opening and closing on anything that happened to drift in. Sorry, good fly tiers: indiscriminate feeding means that junk flies work too.

The subsurface insect action is often considered to be much more vigorous than what is seen on the water surface. Throughout the whole week, nymphing was

the most productive way to put up big numbers. Club members reported that their guides used a variety of sizes and patterns of mayfly nymphs. The trout seemed to be eating everything!

Preparation for your next trip will start with a visit to the Long Beach Casting Club Pond to practice casting and place your fly in the magic feeding lane. See you at the Pond!

LBCC Backpack Trip to Thousand Island Lake!

The LBCC Crew Will Hike From Agnew Meadows to Thousand Island Lake and Back from August 21—August 25

The 2025 LBCC Sierra backcountry fly fishing backpack trip will be August 21–25.

Thursday, August 21 is the drive up day to Agnew Meadows where we will car camp at the USFS Campground, (first come-first served, non-reservation) have a potluck dinner, acclimatize and prepare for an early start the next morning. We will be hiking a loop starting from Agnew Meadows up Shadow Creek to Ediza Lake the first day.



The next day will take us up to the bench below Mt. Ritter on the Sierra Crest, from there we take an interesting country route through open country passing Nydiver Lakes and Garnet Lake as we descend to Thousand Island Lake where we will camp for the next two nights.

We hike out on Monday, August 25 via The River Trail back to Agnew Meadows and drive home.

The hike from Agnew Meadows to Ediza Lake is seven miles overall. The moderately strenuous five-mile section from the San Joaquin River Crossing to the lake has 1,300 feet of elevation gain. Much of the trail follows Shadow Creek, providing fishing stops along the way.

Participants should have some previous mountain backpacking experience, conditioning and weight appropriate equipment allowing for a full pack weight of 32 lbs. or less. Given that this is the High Sierras, be prepared for rapid changes in the weather, including rain, wind and snow.

The Wilderness Permit is currently for nine people, we may be able to add some more at a later date. The work on the road from Minaret Summit to Agnew Meadows will continue into this summer and may cause periodic road closures. We will monitor the conditions and keep participants updated.

In 2022 our trip into the Ediza Lake Area came right after a significant monsoon event that affected the fishability of Shadow Creek and Ediza Lake which normally offer ideal fly fishing opportunities; this trip will let us experience those opportunities and explore new ones along our route.

RULES:


- All participants must be current Long Beach Casting Club members (paid membership).

Instructors will be provided to assist with completing the Casting Skills Challenge. Improving casting skills is difficult without coaching, instruction and **a good lunch**. The steps to improved control of the fly line and significantly better fishing success are mapped out in the Casting Skills Challenge Program, developed by Fly Fishers International.

The Long Beach Casting Club is the place to help with improving casting skills. Experienced casters and instructors are available to assist with completing the challenges.

A simplified summary of the tasks in the casting challenges is below:

BRONZE LEVEL

- Pick up/lay down
- Roll cast
- Accuracy casts
- Shoot line
- Distance cast

SILVER LEVEL

- Pick up/lay down
- Belgian cast
- Accuracy casts
- Shoot line
- Reach mends
- Distance casts

GOLD LEVEL

- Loop control
- Slack line presentation
- Seated/kneeling cast
- Non-dominant accuracy casts
- Curved cast
- Roll cast pickup and shoot
- Back casts delivery
- Distance cast

LBCC Endowment Fund Annual Appeal 2025

Please support the LBCC Endowment Fund with a gift that keeps on giving.

If you have already donated to the Endowment Fund this year, my fellow Endowment Committee members and I thank you. We know you may have already donated to the 100-Year Anniversary Fund Raiser. And you have likely paid your dues, or you will be soon. But if you have the means from good fortune, such as a windfall inheritance, or perhaps a rewarding year of investing in the stock market, and you would like to do more financially to show your appreciation for the knowhow and good will so generously shared by your fellow Club members, the Club will benefit greatly from your support.

One of the best things about donating to the Endowment Fund is that your gift will keep on giving. Because your gift becomes part of the principal in the Fund, it is reinvested and not spent. Only its earnings are used for operational purposes, so it's a gift that keeps on giving.

The Fund was established in 2011 with a modest contribution of \$5,000 and, with the guidance of the Endowment Committee, has grown to \$250,000, an amount that enables it to contribute its net investment earnings to help the Club with operating expenses. This year the Fund will provide a dividend of \$3,000.

Another advantage of the Fund is that it provides the Club with a solid financial foundation, in case a major emergency threatens the future of the Club. The principal in the Fund can be used only for that purpose. It's no small coincidence that the Fund was established in 2011, about two years after the fire that caused major damage to the Clubhouse.

who has a shared passion for flyfishing, as well as to protect wild fish habitat and to promote fly casting, catch and release.

Volunteers Needed for US Open at Long Beach Casting Club!

LBCC hosts the US Open from August 5 to August 9, 2025—scorekeepers and assistant judges are needed

ong Beach Casting Club is hosting the US Open Casting Tournament from August 5-9, 2025. The Club has a rich history in hosting national tournaments during 1953, 1961, 1971, 1978, 2000, 2006, 2011, 2015 and now 2025. We have a reputation for providing well-organized and spectacular tournaments.

To continue this trend, we need dedicated volunteers to function as assistant judges and/or scorekeepers, to support the tasks at hand during this prestigious five-day event. While prior exposure to the specific games is beneficial, it is by no means required. The tasks for these positions are fairly simple and can be summarized as follows:

SCOREKEEPER:

The main task of the scorekeeper is to record the scores achieved by the caster. This requires listening to the head judge and writing the called-out score number on the caster's scorecard. In some events, rare but possible infractions (e.g, "Tick" and "Extra False Cast" are recorded in an abbreviated format.

The scorekeeper sits in a chair next to the caster, where communication with the head judge is easiest. The scorekeeper will assure that the scorecards are delivered to the official scorekeeper in the Clubhouse in an organized and timely manner.

ASSISTANT JUDGE:

The assistant judge assists the experienced head judge, who is ultimately responsible for all judgement calls. In the accuracy games, the assistant judges will

position themselves in the water adjacent to the head judge, and communicate with hand signals to the head judge regarding the score at each target.

The assistant judge also looks out for ticks, i.e., when the fly touches the water during false casting. In distance games, the distance score is noted relative to the buoy distance markers and is measured to the nearest foot.

VOLUNTEER TRAINING SESSIONS:

When: Sundays July 13, July 27 and August 3 from 10:00 am to 12:00 noon

Where: Clubhouse Pond


Training sessions for scorekeeper and assistant judges will include:

- Rules, scoring and demerits of each casting game,
- Terminology/communication used during scoring,
- Positioning and movement of the judges to maximize their vision with minimal disturbance to the caster,
- Completing and processing the scorecards,
- Casting box and tournament etiquette.


The Caddis Couple: My Observations & Techniques


hen caddis flies are active (flying, emerging or submerged), I've found that a two-fly presentation is very effective. The terminal tackle configuration, which I call the "Caddis Couple" is the upper fly—a dry fly pattern, usually a #14 Elk Hair Caddis—followed below by at least 30 inches, an un-weighted #14 Peacock Partridge Soft Hackle.

On a floating line these flies can be fished in many ways representing caddis fly activities. Casting quartering upstream with a drag free drift, the upper fly acts as an indicator of strikes on the lower fly. Often times the upper fly is taken as a dry. Also, on the drift and with the soft hackle acting as an anchor, the dry fly can be lifted off the waters surface and laying back down on the surface imitates a female caddis laying or dapping her eggs in the surface film. At the end of



the downstream drift, drag starts. Pulsing the flies with the rod tip usually brings more strikes than pure dragging on the swing.

When the Caddis Couple is directly below you, let them hang for a while in the current. Retrieve slowly,



sometimes with very small pulses. Often the flies pass over the fish into its window of vision bringing a vicious reactive strike at the emerging flies. If the fish are rising, a small split shot can be pinched on 18" above the bottom fly allowing it to sink deeper throughout drift and retrieve to fish holding on the bottom. The upper dry fly gets pulled under occasionally but the number of hits on the lower fly makes it all worthwhile.

All in all, under all of the Caddis Couple's hook-ups approximately 50% on each fly occurs and the catch rate is significantly better than when only one fly is used. Sometimes both flies are hit during a swing resulting in the chaos of a double hook-up. This is really true when both fish are larger than 12"! When it becomes really interesting is when they each go in opposite directions often resulting in the loss of one or both fish. Of course, if they both swim towards you there is the chance of netting them both and increasing your catch rate!

Happy fishing!

He spends most of his waking moments fishing or working out how he is going to fish the next time he goes out and has the photos and fishing logs to prove it. If Dean uses the system described in the article it's because it works and works well—ed.)

Fly of the Month: Green River 2025

I know I end up sounding like a broken record but **DANG**, the Green River is amazing! This was my 14th consecutive year—yes, even through COVID—fishing there and this one rates as numero dos on my Best Trip Ever scale (Number One was the trip to the Green with my daughter Nicole in 2011). Like every year it was different and in just about every fashion, but to say I got lucky is an understatement. However it didn't start out that way...

On Saturday before leaving FlyBuy in the late morning I was backing out in my car. I was using my rear camera looking at the tree drawing closer when someone shouts my name. You know what happened: **bang**, with the sound of all the rear window glass exploding out of its frame. The window frame and rear gate were bent, so no Safelite for me! It was off to talk to my insurance and get a rental car.

After a long drive, yup I go straight through, I got to Flaming Gorge Resort and was able to check in a little early. Sure, I could have just gone down to the river, but trying to put together your gear from a full car is a pain in the butt. Much nicer if you can dump off stuff and assemble rods and reels in the comfort of your motel room, and then hit the river all kitted out, which is exactly what I did. I got to the river and managed a couple of fish, but my timing was way off and I missed several grabs. I kinda think exhaustion from the drive up and the stress of the day before with the car had something to do with it—well, duh, John! An early, light dinner and sleep was needed plus I had a zero dark thirty start in the morning.

Now the last several years I have been heading up to the Green a couple of weeks earlier. Not really the best time to go, but I combined tying flies at the East Idaho Fly Tying Expo in Idaho Falls as an excuse to go fishing. Well, that was not going to happen this year. Due to a scheduling conflict that tying event started on Valentine's Day, and there was no way I was going to fish the Green in mid-February! Additionally, many of my friends who attend, even those who live a lot closer to Idaho Falls, weren't even going. That made my decision to go a bit later than usual an easy one. Wow, what a difference two or



three weeks make. Last year I was frozen and frostbitten, and this year I came home with sunburn!

Monday morning arrived and it was sunny and a balmy 38° (last year it was 12° and snowing). I have only fished with three guides on this river: Dano Bolton, Cori-Alice Holladay and today's guide: Doug Roberts, owner of Old Moe Guide Service. Of the three, I have fished with Doug the most-the guy knows his stuff, and I consider him my friend and not a guide. As usual, we met at Trout Creek Flies at 0700 and made the drive to the dam. We were going to do an "A-B" float. Since there were still spawning rainbows in the river, we started with an egg on the bottom and a BWO nymph on top. No, we were not targeting the redds and spawning trout; only fishing normally and looking for opportunistic trout with a liking for eggs for breakfast. The result was a great start to the day: three very large trout, including a rainbow that was at least 23" and possibly 24". A personal best for a Green rainbow!

As the day moved along the eggs slowed down, and it was obvious that the blue-wings were starting to

move. So, as more fish ate the top fly, it was two BWO nymphs on the rig and a lot of fish in the net. At about 12:00 we got to Little Hole and the dry fly hatch was in full flower. We sat in the middle of the river off Ramp 3 ,and landed a half dozen on dries. We still had a loooong way to go, and by the end of the float we had landed 40 and more, with most in the 17" to 19" and a half dozen 20"—21" and a couple of zingers near or at 23"—24".

Day Two dawned a bit cooler, with nice clear skies. Met Doug at the same time and same place and ready to hit the Green for a "B-C" float. After the previous day I expected good dry fly fishing, but a tailwind popped up before the hatch began and we ended up nymphing all day, with 60+ fish in the net. Never done that before! Day Three was intended to be another day with Doug but high winds were projected so we moved that float to Friday. Frankly, my wrist, arm and shoulder were grateful! We had been using 11½ nymph and Spey rods to fish deep to great effect, but with the bottom fly well below my hand it played hell landing fish. So Wednesday became a lightweight day of fishing a trout Spey and some nymphing, with little or no dry fly fishing.

Thursday brought a beautiful day and Cori-Alice Holladay, my guide from last year, and we laughed our way through another fantastic day of fishing. We only used three patterns all day and they absolutely worked. We did a "B" float and caught fish the whole way, including some fun dry fly on the river right channel of Grasshopper Island. Last fish of the day was a 23"-24" brown, topping off another 60+ fish day.





Friday was the last day and I was back with Doug. We were going to do another "B-C" float. On Tuesday we'd had a tailwind, and today it was a headwind, which actually makes fishing easier. Also, after a day of respite from the really long rod with Cori-Alice, it was back to the 11½ footer. I took a couple of Advil with my heart meds before driving down to meet him. Though painful, that rig did not disappoint. No eggs today; perdigon-style nymphs and worms were the order of the day. No hatch due to the wind but again, the Baetis were moving and the fish were eating. More quality fish all day long, and we dinged another 60 fish at least. I know I keep tossing out that number but we really do discuss it and while it is an estimate, it is a really accurate estimate.

Many of the members going up to the Green will want to know the patterns, but by the time they get there it will have changed. But for reference, Cori-Alice and I only used three patterns: a perdigon on top with a copper bead and green quill body, a gray-on-gray spider at the bottom of the rig and a cripple style dry with a longish elk wing. All were size #18 or #20. Doug's flies are a bit more mysterious (sworn to secrecy on a couple) but perdigon-style nymphs and a Pheasant Tail derivative served us well. Also, we fished both yarn and plastic eggs and, of course, my favorite below Red Creek pattern: the worm! The browns love 'em and if they are a bit larger the white-fish won't touch 'em—too much, anyway.

That's the trip. It was truly epic, with a horrible start (my car, of course), but some of the best fishing this old boy has ever had!



Fly Tying Tip: Thread (Again)




very Sowbug Roundup as I do my wire weaves, LI get asked about why I spin my bobbin holder. This is one of the basic principles of fly tying. Thread is what we use, for the most part, to bind materials to the hook to create our flies. Thread is generally made up of individual strands of polyester, nylon, gel spun polyester, cotton or other filaments. As we wrap thread over our hooks, we put a "twist" into the thread. Right-handed tiers put a clockwise (as you look down from the top) twist in the thread, left-handed tiers a counterclockwise twist. This twist tends to cord up the thread, and also causes it to want to furl. If you are tying deer hair bugs or similar the cording may be what you want. For a flatter, smoother body you want to flatten your thread out; hence the "spinning" of the bobbin holder. This will give you a smoother layer and less bulk, and mounting dry fly hackle will be easier, and it helps the barbs stay perpendicular to the hook shank.


As indicated, right-handed tiers will generally put a clockwise twist, so to flatten it, let the bobbin holder hang down and it will automatically start to untwist. In a hurry? Spin it counterclockwise. Lefties, spin it clockwise. Not only will this flatten your thread but it will help in catching materials. If you have a totally flat thread and start to do a loose wrap to catch material the thread will stay above the hook (Photo#1). If you have a slight counterclockwise twist, the thread loop will jump toward the back of the hook (Photo#2) and if the loop has a slight clockwise twist, the loop will jump forward (Photo#3). By controlling the amount of twist you have in the thread, it can be one of the best tools for binding down the materials in the manner you want.


One last thing to pay attention to: if you have a lot of twist in your thread as you start a whip finish, the thread may furl if you lose the loop causing the thread to break as you attempt to finish (Photo#4). If you flatten the thread before the whip finish and you lose the thread loop, it will still finish up well. Watch all

good tiers and they do twist/un-twist without even thinking as they make the thread do what they want.
